

On the 5th of December, the students of the department of Humanities were taken to Don Bosco NGO located in Gandhinagar. The day started at 8.00 A.M. for the students with a session by Ms. Sameera and Ms. Teeshta at the college campus which included qualitative discussions and games that conveyed a great message about the value of individual life.

Following this, the students were briefed about the day's plan. Further was a briefing about the tasks which the students had to do by 22nd December like crowdfunding and donating old clothes which would be useful for the children. The classroom gathering dispersed and the students finally reached the NGO. The students were already divided into 4 teams and had to be in the same for the rest of the day for all the tasks.

When we reached there one of the faculties of the NGO delineated about the organization. He also added how the children are rescued from mitigated, grievous situations and further taken care of by them. He claimed that around 30 children are rescued every day from different places. The counselors help the children get out of their misery. But still, they have a poignant reminder of their past. He also shared some of their life stories which students could greatly sympathize with. It was followed by a Q&A session and as this session ended it was time for the much-awaited interaction with the children. The first two teams led their ways to interact with the children. Meanwhile, the other two teams went on to interact with the faculty. The students gave a warm welcome to everyone. Though they were a little reserved in the beginning, they gelled up within no time once the college students started playing games with them. Their assigned tasks were accomplished and they danced towards the end of their interaction to bring it to a close. Later the 2 teams swapped and reached the top floor once they were done. Once all the students assembled back there was a debriefing session where the students shared their experience and were given three questions to ponder upon and share their reflections.

This interaction helped the students realize how fortunate they were to lead a protected life in comparison to the children at the NGO. The NGO is doing a great job in rescuing children from different places and grave situations and shaping their lives by helping them become responsible citizens. The organization also helps in finding and reuniting the children with their families if they successfully trace them.
