



Despite it being a mock exhibition, a lot of effort was put into producing satisfactory results. Regardless of the time constraint, being able to pull it off within one week was an endeavour.

The topic of the discussion revolved around pluralism in India. Since the exhibition was interdisciplinary it was a must to incorporate the different disciplines, seeing them through different lenses and perspectives. The faculty and HoD guided them throughout and gave the students the freedom to select the content they wanted to present. The discussion was going to happen at a stretch of approximately 25 minutes. Time management being the main issue here, they had to make their content crisp and short. The discussion was split into two rounds talking about pluralism in philosophical, sociological, economical, psychological, historical and political backgrounds where the context about pluralism was derived from. Seeing pluralism in a very diverse country like that of India a lot of critical analysis was put forth, a statement of the drawbacks and growth of a pluralistic society was made. Furthermore, to study Indian pluralism it was compared to that of America's. On the day of the event, the stage was set and the chairs were placed in the form of a semicircle where the students were made to face each other formally. Towards the end of the exhibition came the long awaited panel discussion, being well prepared the students did the discussion extremely well. The chief guest spontaneously asked them questions. By the end of the discussion he was quite impressed with their answers. Overall, the panel discussion was a success and the students hope to have many more such opportunities.



World History Day

On 21st June 2023, the Department of Humanities organised a special talk by Ms. Waraji Adiga, a Research Associate in the Centre for Ancient History and Culture. Ms. Warija who was a former IT employee expressed her immense interest in the Sanskrit language and stated that "All of us in the team have left our professional careers to enter this academia for Sanskrit research, in search of hidden truth. We have learnt Sanskrit and try to use our technical background to find new information in old literature." She pursued Sanskrit and completed her Masters. Later, she shared a few of her experiences with the students. One of the most memorable experiences was when she found a manuscript in Nepal that was in the local Sanskrit language and could not be deciphered easily. She had to interact with the locals and finally was able to decipher it. During her presentation, she quoted many shlokas from the Vedas, Mahabharata and the Upanishads. Most of the students were Sanskrit students which helped them understand these shlokas better and made the session more interactive.
