The Paradox of Water and Us

The students of the II PUC of the Humanities Department at Jain College were presented with one last challenge: an English group presentation on the poem "Water" by Challapalli Swaroopa Rani as a final challenge. The primary aim of assigning such presentations was to promote critical thinking, literary analysis, and the exploration of social commentary within the texts. The students were required to draw parallels between Keats' portrayal of the nightingale as a witness and Rani's depiction of water as a witness to social injustice, allowing them to compare and connect the two works and gain a more comprehensive understanding of the topic. The real-life example provided an opportunity for discussions on the impact of discrimination on vital resources and the potential consequences, such as conflicts over water resources. The overall objective of the presentation was to encourage thoughtful reflections on literature, societal issues, and their interconnectedness. To evaluate their interdisciplinary approach, their sociology and history lecturers were also invited to the session, and their presence helped students present their points holistically.

The students were divided into three teams and assigned the task of exploring different water-related topics. One such topic was "Social activists have claimed that water has the potential to trigger a third world war." The team examined this topic from multiple angles, considering the social, psychological, and historical factors that could contribute to such a dire outcome. They explored case studies, including the conflict between Karnataka and Tamil Nadu over the Kaveri River, and shared and debated their opinions. They highlighted how access to this vital resource is unequal and how this inequality could have a significant psychological impact, leading to global conflict.

The discussion shifted from addressing water scarcity to exploring the realm of Dalit literature, which certainly broadened their perspective. By offering such diverse displays and ideas, the project enabled pupils to gain a deeper comprehension of the hidden facets of the world, the perspectives they haven't encountered, and the circumstances they haven't undergone. This task effectively promotes interdisciplinary learning and inspires students to become change-makers in their societies by providing them with a platform to engage in critical thinking and self-examination.

With the felicitation segment concluding, students took the opportunity to share cherished moments from the LitFest, creating a meaningful conclusion to the assembly. The collaborative efforts of students and faculty members during this assembly mirror the proactive and positive approach to fostering a vibrant academic environment within the Humanities Department

To provoke a thought on these questions, Ranga Milana (Theatre and Performing Arts Club) of the Humanities Department at Jain College achieved a significant milestone on January 10th, Wednesday, 2024. They performed their first-ever theatre event The event was divided into three parts, with a monologue from "Richard II" by Shakespeare as the opening act, followed by a play based on "Istifa" by Munshi Premchand and finally a scene from the movie "Heat" as the closing act. The monologue performed by Ms. Vandana Victor, the teacher coordinator of Ranga Milana, created an atmosphere of drama, talent, and excitement, setting the tone for the rest of the event.

The play "Istifa" explores the theme of "The Individual and The Society" through the portrayal of two stories, one on-stage and the other offstage, that run parallel to each other. The onstage story revolved around the life of Fatehchand, an office clerk working for an oppressive and hubristic boss, while the off-stage story explored the life of a maid. Fatehchand was a loyal worker who considered his work to be his world, but he was a failure with no self-respect. Similarly, the maid was ill-treated by her employer, the Madam. Fatehchand and the maid never stood up for themselves. Fatehchand was made aware through his wife's words that a man's selfrespect holds more importance, and the maid, after years of ill-treatment, realised that she did not deserve it. The play took a drastic turn when Fatehchand and the maid struck their respective employers. The play ended when both Fatehchand and the maid resigned from their

respective jobs, freeing themselves from the chains of oppression.

In the closing act, the audience is revealed of the polarised society through two individuals, a cop, working for the system and the other a thief, working against the system. The scene showcased the dichotomy of a thief and a cop and how despite their contrasting interests, they seem to be quite similar.

The play made an attempt through light on socialisation and power hierarchies in the society. Art is a very profound way of instilling thoughts and the event has successfully provoked the young minds to look into the conundrum of the individual and the society.

Overall, the event was a masterful display of talent, showcasing the club members' abilities to portray characters, convey powerful messages, and entertain the audience. It left an unforgettable impression, and the audience was left wanting more.
