Securing a Sustainable Community Fridge: Humanities Student's Rigorous Data Collection Paves the Way

The 2nd PUC Humanities students at Jain College now continue their inspiring journey of establishing a "Community Fridge" to combat the issue of hunger. To carry out this project successfully, the class was divided into four teams, each assigned to different locations such as Monotype, Yellachanhalli, Yadav Nagar, and BTM Layout. Their primary objective was to conduct thorough surveys, gather valuable data from the residents, and make insightful observations to determine the suitability of these areas for setting up a community fridge.

Under the expert guidance of Ms Shakti Shukla, the teams were well-equipped to gather the necessary information effectively. The teams carefully examined the number of potential donors and beneficiaries, along with the resources needed for both setting up and keeping the refrigerator operational in the specific location.
