Historical Inquiries:

Team-Based Projects by Humanities Students

The II PUC students in Humanities at JAIN College were allowed to display their creativity, and analytical and critical thinking skills through a presentation for History class. The students were divided into three teams, namely Rose, Lily, and Tulip. Each team was assigned a specific topic that resonated with the first History chapter and given the freedom to choose their preferred mode of presentation. Team Rose, headed by Pranav, critically analysed the works of poets and lyricists, emphasising the significance of historical sources in shaping narratives through an engaging PowerPoint presentation. Meanwhile, Team Lily, led by Janvi, created a captivating digital poster highlighting the geographic influence on Bangalore's culture and civilisation. Team Tulip, under the leadership of Mahika, produced a thought-provoking 15-minute documentary on India's socio-political profile, featuring data collection and interviews with experts and laypeople. They also got the chance to get in touch with Mr S.K. Aruni, a historian who has specialised in primary sources and Ms Shakti Shukla, a sociologist at JAIN College. The role of the team leaders was not only to contribute to the presentation but also to ensure that the team members were actively participating and contributing to the presentation. The teams faced several challenges throughout the process of preparation and the presentation but with their constant efforts and Ms Vandana's guidance the students managed to pull it off and produce good results. The main goal of the project was to gain insight into conducting historical inquiries and to learn effective teamwork and time management skills. The project highlighted the importance of relying on our critical thinking skills and analytical skills and tackling other challenges. It also emphasised the message that growth comes through persistence and learning from mistakes.
